Approval of Minutes

Presentations

N.J.S.P.

Lt. Clifford Repetti, Station Commander for the Port Norris barracks provided the following report for the month of December 2019.

Lt. Repetti explained that the burglaries seem to be when it appears that no one is home and advised residents to be aware. He also recommended that residents be vigilant about locking outside sheds and their cars and to keep valuables ‘out-of-sight’.

Lt. Repetti explained that from December 1st through January 15th a radar detail was run on Main & High Streets in Leesburg and Dorchester with 283 issued tickets/warnings. Lt. Repetti explained that complaints had been received regarding speeding in this area and that tickets & warnings issued were to try and change behaviors and lessen accidents. Lt. Repetti further explained that there have been no significant events in the township since the beginning of December.

Lt. Repetti explained to the public that should they have information regarding criminal activity or concerns to come to the barracks or give them a call.

First Public Comments Session

Mr. Whildin made a motion to open the first public comment session noting the time at 7:37 pm; seconded by Mr. Ashton.

Mr. Dickinson, Leesburg, asked the Township Committee if NJSP was going to do more night patrols of High & Main streets. Mr. Whildin stated that when he received Mr. Dickinson's call he contacted the NJSP to request night patrols and was advised that this would be done with staffing allows it. Mr. Ashton explained that from his knowledge there are only 4 officers at night presently and this could potentially be a problem. Mr. Dickinson warned that with 'good' weather residents are out walking more often along the main streets and speeders are at taking a risk of hitting a pedestrian.

Bob Whildin, Heislerville, asked if the Township Committee was aware of the 'new' dog licensing rule pertaining to rabies vaccination and furthered that his veterinarian will not overlap rabies shots to accommodate the licensing requirement. Mr. Whildin asked 'who' gets the late fee and Mr. Oliver stated it is split between the township and the state. Mr. DiDomenico explained that there is no latitude for the municipality with this law.

Linda Reeves, Port Elizabeth, inquired regarding progress with the Fox Street access road. Mr. Oliver explained that a NJDOT Municipal Aid grant for \$188,000 was received for the project and explained the street is not projected to be widened. Mr. Oliver further explained that he had met with school representatives Penny Wells, BOE President, Patricia Powell, Business Administrator, Frank DiDomenico, Solicitor for MRTES and Walter Kappeler, Superintendent to review the 'conceptual' plan. Mr. Oliver explained that the school was amendable to Fox Street paving and further paving onto school property for the access roadway. The intention is for buses to be able to leave safely from the school and to make an emergency exit. Diversion may be needed to complete the project. Additionally, the school was agreeable to giving up the soccer field.

Linda Reeves, Port Elizabeth asked what are the buses doing now when leaving the school. Mr. Oliver explained that when summer time hits the increased traffic makes it more dangerous for the buses to exit the school. Ms. Reeves asked why the buses are not making a right onto Route 47 to Broadway and then to Port Cumberland where they can access the traffic light. Ms. Reeves also offered that other schools have crossing guards to help control the traffic. Mr. Oliver explained the grant must be utilized within two years or it will need to be returned to the state. Mr. Oliver offered that the school can get NJSP to help with traffic control. Mr. DiDomenico stated that a 'crossing guard' would need to be employed by the township not the school.

Ms. Reeves added that the school board should be directing the bus drivers on exiting the school. Penny Wells, BOE President explained that the bus drivers were already directed on leaving the school but parents can not be told to make a right when exiting. Ms. Wells stated the school was looking at an alternative again today. Ms. Reeves stated that 'if it is safer to make a right' then the bus drivers should be directed to make a right when exiting the school as this appears to give the advantage of safety. Ms. Wells stated that she will be contacting legislators about a 'white line' change which may help and that the back exit is needed to accommodate emergencies that 'block' the current exit. Mr. Oliver emphasized that the current conceptual plans do not provide for widening of Fox Street.

Mr. Whildin made a motion to close the first public comment session noting the time at 7:57 pm; seconded by Mr. Whildin.

The township has protection under Title 59, whereas, private property owners do not.

TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE REPORTS

William Ashton, Committeeman

Mr. Ashton explained that the township owned speed monitoring sign was posted in the area marked for 35 mph and during the time period of December 16 to December 22 cars were spotted doing 46-61 mph in this area. The sign is being moved to the 25 mph and the data will be available shortly. Mr. Ashton explained the accusation that residents are being targeted is not true; enforcement of the speed limit pertains to all travelers in the area.

Mr. Ashton stated that Monday nights meeting was very good. Mr. Ashton stated he looked at the repair bills for the OEM truck due to the request to purchase a new one. Mr. Ashton found that over a 46 month period the monthly cost for repairs was \$370; total of \$5,000 in repairs. Mr. Ashton further stated that for a truck with only 93,000 miles the total repairs have been around \$17,000; the cost of the truck does not substantiate the mileage versus repairs paid to date. Mr. Ashton suggested when it is time to purchase a new truck that a different make and model be considered.

Mr. Ashton stated that the process to renew the Comcast Cable franchise agreement has begun and that an ascertainment proceeding should take place within 6 months from receipt of the notice. Mr. Ashton stated that the township is aware that there are some areas in the township that do not currently have Comcast service available to them. Presently the HPM (House per Mile) that Comcast uses for Maurice River township is 25 HPM; possibly this can be lowered. Mr. Ashton stated he is hopeful that the township will be able to negotiate better service for residents.

Mr. Ashton stated that on Monday night a resident suggested catching and euthanizing the feral cats. Mr. Ashton pointed out that a cat was hit by a car and taken to the vet by Animal Control; the cost to euthanize this cat was \$100. Mr. Ashton explained that for eleven cats that would be \$1,100; there is no justification of spending this type of money. Mr. Ashton furthered that he was not originally aware that one cat can produce 4 litters a year, therefore when nothing is done that is a lot of cats. The results of the kittens not produced due to the TNVR trial program this year are astounding.

Mr. Ashton announced that presently it was looked at as to how the Matts Landing area was purchased and it was found that it was purchased with federal money. There is a process that must be followed to get the property to the township's ownership. The project is still alive.

Mr. Ashton stated baseball sign-ups are being held the weekend of January 25th and January 26th.

Ken Whildin, Deputy Mayor

Mr. Whildin pointed out that the OEM truck is diesel and he is not aware of how many hours there are on the motor as many times the truck is just running for emergencies.

Mr. Whildin announced that the Dollar General is having a 'soft' opening near the end of this month. The attorney for Dollar General stated that everyone that they have contacted in the township has been very cooperative through this process.

Mr. Whildin attending a Bayshore Council meeting today and they are looking at the impervious coverage topic.

Mr. Whildin announced that contrary to rumors the Geotube is not compromised. The problem is people walking on it.

Mr. Whildin stated that the county started work on Port Elizabeth Cumberland Road to get rid of the large puddles.

J. Roy Oliver, Mayor

1. Does the Township want membership with ANJR for 2020?

Mr. Whildin made a motion to not obtain membership with ANJR for 2020; seconded by Mr. Ashton.

Mr. Oliver provided that two years ago he asked the public two questions regarding feral cats and received an affirmative from everyone questions. Mr. Oliver confirmed that a female cat has gestation 4 times a year. Mr. Oliver elaborated that during the trial program 50 female cats were trapped and spayed which hypothetically would be 200 kittens in one year. Neutered/spayed feral cats will die off naturally but it should be noted that these cats also receive a rabies vaccination. Mr. Oliver stated that once additional money is received to fund the program other areas in the township will be addressed.

PROFESSIONAL REPORTS

Engineer

Mr. Morrissey provided the following report:

2018 Road & Harriet/Taylor and additional paving Newell Road – will proceed when weather permits.

CVFC – letter of appeal has been drafted regarding the septic flow.

Fox Street Access – there is no intention to widen this street and drainage issues will be addressed.

Bike Path Grant – decision from NJDOT has not yet been received.

Carlisle Place Road Tractor Trailer Turning – the radius for turning is being looked at by the Cumberland County engineer. Alternative is to direct them to use Meadow or Church. A radius analysis is needed. A possible solution is to open up the turning radius access. Signage is not the answer and coordination with the shipyard is necessary.

Sapello Release of Easement – waiting for response from Green Acres and Pineland so that a meeting can be set up.

Deerwood Avenue - Application for Local Aid Infrastructure Fund (Discretionary Funding) to be submitted to DOT. Pending DA scoping.

Brian Guenther, Carlisle Place Road, stated that he installed cameras due to problems with tractor trailers to the shipyard. Mr. Guenther stated he has photographs of vehicles on the sidewalk and on his property. Mr. Guenther stated tractor trailers get stuck trying to make this turn and most times it takes between 10 to 15 minutes for them to get unstuck. Mr. Guenther further expressed concern that there are 8 children living and playing on this street. Mr. Guenther also requested a “Child at Play” sign be installed on the street. Mr. Oliver stated this sign has already been requested.

Mr. Guenther explained a confrontational situation that occurred in December when he was telling a driver how to get unstuck and he was approached by 4 shipyard employees screaming at him and one of them knocked him to the ground. The NJSP were called and the 4 men stated that Mr. Guenther was laying in the street which prompted the confrontation. He will continue to call the NJSP as needed. Mr. Guenther proposed to install a sign near the 35-mph sign. The solicitor and engineer will provide viable options to remedy this problem.

Mr. Guenther commented that the Laurel Lake Dollar General is filthy and questioned how this will be prevented at the one in Port Elizabeth. The Township Committee reassured Mr. Guenther that they will talk to the General Manager.

Solicitor

Mr. DiDomenico stated a letter should be received from PSE&G in the next few weeks regarding the land donation.

Second Public Comment Session

Mr. Whildin made a motion to open the second public comment session noting the time at 8:40 pm; seconded by Mr. Ashton.

Ben Stowman, Delmont, commented that support of the second amendment rights is a smart move by the Township Committee. Mr. Stowman added that Virginia is a hot bed right now as liberal entities are creating problems.

Ben Stowman, Delmont, explained he recently attending a state meeting (309 Stack Holder) which pertains to coastal areas both bay and ocean. The state is listening to concerns expressed by the Bayshore communities. Public access to waterfronts and wind energy are hot topics. The Delaware Bay and Maurice River have been referenced which is good news.

Mr. Stowman announced that the topic of node versus center is still being worked on by the Township Planner. Presently the allowance is only 2-3% coverage if the ground is near the water but the centers/nodes could allow up to 80% coverage. The State does acknowledge nodes. Mr. Stowman stated that Ms. Morrissey is requesting a pre-petition meeting with the state to discuss the centers designation which were done several years ago. Recently the state wanted to change them and asked the townships to reply regarding keeping them. Mr. Oliver explained the redevelopment area on River Road which involves the old Bacon Farm, Boatworld and Whibco properties. The Township is working with the owners so the properties can be developed.

Mr. Oliver announced to the public that Voting District #1 is being moved to Boggs Hall (Port Elizabeth UMC).

Linda Reeves, stated that it is very important for residents to attend the meetings and added that she appreciates everything the Township Committee does for the residents.

Linda Reeves, Port Elizabeth, explained that rain water runs off of Port Elizabeth Cumberland Road onto Fox Street and floods her front yards as well as her neighbor's basement. She added that Fox Street has not been paved in around 40 years and a basin to catch the water is needed. Mr. Morrissey stated that drainage will be installed and they have noted two areas with water retention problems. Mr. Morrissey explained that a survey and elevation will need to be done. Mr. Morrissey added that the basement flooding may not be from rain water but from ground water.

Mr. Oliver stated that the Township Committee works well together and that they care committed to getting things done for the township.

Mr. Whildin made a motion to close the second public comment session noting the time at 8:56 pm; seconded by Mr. Ashton.

**A RESOLUTION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MAURICE RIVER, COUNTY OF CUMBERLAND
DECLARING MAURICE RIVER TOWNSHIP
A SECOND AMENDMENT TOWNSHIP**

WHEREAS, the Constitution of the United States of America is the supreme law of our nation, and

WHEREAS, the Second Amendment of the Constitution states, “A well-regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.”, and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Supreme Court in the District of Columbia v. Heller, 554 U.S. 570 (2008) affirmed that the Second Amendment right to keep and bear arms is not connected in any way to the service of the militia, and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Supreme Court in the United States v. Miller, 307 U.S. 174 (1939) stated firearms that are part of ordinary military use (weapons of common use) that can contribute to the common defense and are protected by the Second Amendment, and

WHEREAS, there are an estimated 12 million Americans who lawfully carry concealed firearms, and

WHEREAS, abridging the rights of lawful gun owners does not reduce the criminal use of firearms by violent offenders, and

WHEREAS, New Jersey Second Amendment Society and Mark Cheeseman v. Christopher S. Porrino U.S. District Court 3rd, stated “The Second Amendment extends, prima facie to all instruments that constitute bearable arms, even those not in existence at the time of the founding.”, and

WHEREAS, New Jersey Attorney General Burton Sills, who “close[ly] participated[ed] in the drafting and presentation of the [1966] Gun Control Law,” and whose views New Jersey has relied upon to decide close interpretive questions concerning that legislation. See Service Armament Co. v. Hyland, 362 A.2d 13, 18, 70 N.J. 550, 560 (1976). In the lead-up to the 1966 Gun Control Law, Attorney General Sills had publicly explained that there was presently “no law against walking down the street with a weapon in your hand or on your body so long as it isn’t concealed,” and that individuals without concealed-carry permits were free to carry guns “in plain view”, and

WHEREAS, in the A-165 Debates of 1966, Attorney General Sills explained that under the new law, “standards are set forth to determine if the issuance of a permit to . . . carry a pistol or revolver would be in the interest of public health, safety or welfare,” and “(f)or those who wish to carry a pistol or revolver, permits will be required as they are under present New Jersey law, and

WHEREAS, violations of existing laws, statutes and regulations are already criminal offenses, many being felonies, and

WHEREAS, gun control laws, including a plethora of current proposed legislation, are not evidence-based, and

WHEREAS, New Jersey’s Gun Control Law is highly purposed and conscientiously designed toward

preventing criminal and other unfit elements from acquiring firearms while enabling the fit elements of society to obtain them with minimal burdens and inconveniences.” [Burton v. Sills 53 N.J. 86 (1968) 248 A.2d 521 at 105.], and

WHEREAS, a law-abiding citizen of the State of New Jersey who possess a N.J. Firearms Purchaser Identification Card has met the burden of proof to be a law-abiding citizen and is immune from further legislation and laws that are in violation of the Constitution of the Unites States of America.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Committee of Maurice River Township, County of Cumberland and State of New Jersey as follows:

The Township Committee declares the Township of Maurice River to be a 2nd Amendment / Lawful Gun Owner Township as defined herein:

- a. The Township Committee supports the rights of lawful gun owners to lawfully use firearms; to defend themselves, their loved ones and other innocents; to lawfully hunt to provide sustenance for their families; and to lawfully participate in shooting sports up to and including Olympic sports.
- b. The Township Committee opposed further interference with, or abridging of, the rights of lawful gun owners.
- c. The Township Committee opposes gun control, “gun safety” legislation, or “red flag laws”, State, Federal or local. Agenda No. XI 26, Page 2 of 2.
- d. The Township Committee espouses holding accountable the violent criminal offenders, rather than irrational and/or disproven attempts to control lawful tools of self-defense, hunting and sport.
- e. The Township of Maurice River recognizes said Township is not immune from past, present or future laws and/or legislation passed by the N.J. Legislature regarding State and local firearm laws or statutes. Therefore, all residents of Maurice River Township can be prosecuted for ignoring or breaking present State laws in force.
